The Precepts of the Catholic Church

LIVING DISCIPLESHIP PRACTICING OUR FAITH

The context of our faith as Catholic Christians is the relationship that God offers us through His Son Jesus, and the same relationship that we enter into mediated through the One High Priest, Jesus.

From the Catechism, paragraphs 2041ff, The precepts of the Church are set in the context of *a moral life bound to and nourished by liturgical life*. The obligatory character of these positive laws decreed by the pastoral authorities is meant to guarantee to the faithful *the very necessary minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort*, in the growth in love of God and neighbor:

1. *You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor.* To observe the Sabbath has two-fold effect: using our God-given freedom, we worship God and sanctify the world. In other words, Sunday reminds us of our task to recognize the holiness of God and sacred work that God has shared with us. From a relational perspective, we nurture your relationship with Jesus by regularly spending time with him.
2. *You shall confess your sins at least once a year.* Through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we recognize that our relationship with Jesus entails ongoing conversion and forgiveness - as disciples, we seek to continue making ourselves better. From a relational perspective, we recognize our faults and move on through reconciliation.
3. *You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season.* The Easter season is so important that it requires a minimum encounter with Jesus. His resurrection is a singular event that has brought defeat to sin and death. From a relational perspective, our life revolves around Jesus; we the Body celebrate the important milestones in the life of Jesus our Head.
4. *You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church.* Our practice of fasting and abstinence shows our mastery over our instincts and desires, our capacity to see and value God the Giver over His gifts. From a relational perspective, we make self-sacrifices for loved ones - we forego some good so that we benefit from more good.
5. *You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church.* Jesus entrusted us his mission. This is why we exist as his Church: to do his work. From a relational perspective, our love for Jesus leads to love our neighbor.

A Christ-centered response to Coronavirus

"For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and that of the gospel will save it. What profit is there for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life? What could one give in exchange for his life? Whoever is ashamed of me and of my words in this faithless and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of when he comes in his Father's glory with the holy angels."

- Mark 8:35-38

From the perspective of the Christian faith, in this time of pandemic and lockdown, for the Church to be considered as "non-essential" does not make any sense, especially when liquor stores are open, and sadly, abortion facilities too.

I recognize the importance of working collaboratively with secular institutions and authorities in promoting the common good, but can secular institutions and authorities really decide whether the Church is essential or not? In other words, if and when secular institutions and authorities consider the Church as essential, by what grounds do they make such claim? And if and when secular institutions and authorities consider the Church as non-essential, by what grounds do they also make such claim?

That Jesus Christ established the Church renders the Church essential enough to and for every Christian disciple. Jesus did not entrust the keys to the kingdom to anyone but to Peter alone.

The supernatural care for the soul cannot and must not ignore the care for the body, for the same God created the soul and the body. As safety measures are adapted by liquor stores, comparable safety measures can be and are adapted by churches, by reasonable disciples.

What is the purpose of this reflection? That we may have and continue to have an intentionally Christ-centered perspective and response on the coronavirus, and that we resist, at least, psychologically, the consequences of being publicly considered "non-essential." Because, at least, one person each day receives a sacrament, as is our case at Saint Patrick's, the Church is and remains essential.

Child, "How old are you, Grandpa?"

Grandpa, "I'm 81, dear."

Child, "So does that mean you were alive during the Coronavirus?"

Grandpa, "Yes, I was."

Child, "Wow. That must have been horrible, Grandpa. We were learning about that at school this week. They told us about how all the schools had closed. And moms and dads couldn't go to work so didn't have as much money to do

nice things. They said that you weren't allowed to go and visit your friends and family and couldn't go out anywhere. They told us that the shops and stores ran out of lots of things so you didn't have much bread, and flour, and toilet rolls. They said that summer holidays were cancelled. And they told us about all those thousands of people that got very sick and who died. They explained how hard all the doctors and nurses and all essential workers worked, and that lots of them died, too. That must have been so horrible, grandpa!"

Grandpa, "Well, that is all correct. And I know that because I read about it when I was older. But to tell you the truth I remember it differently... I remember playing in the garden for hours with mom and dad and having picnics outside and lots of bbqs. I remember making things and fishing with my Dad and baking with my Mom. I remember making

forts and learning how to do hand stands and back flips. I remember having quality time with my family. I remember Mom's favorite words becoming 'Hey, I've got an idea...' Rather than 'Maybe later or tomorrow I'm a bit busy.' I remember making our own bread and pastry. I remember having movie night three or four times a week instead of just one. It was a horrible time for lots of people you are right. But I remember differently."

Remember how our children will remember these times. Be in control of the memories they are creating right now, so that through all the awful headlines and emotional stories for so many that they will come to read in future years, they can remember the happy times."

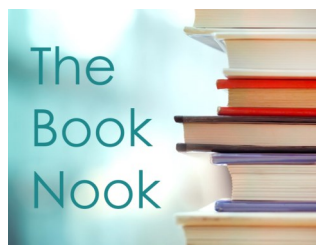


May God bless you. May he be the guardian of your Heart, Mind, & Soul. In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

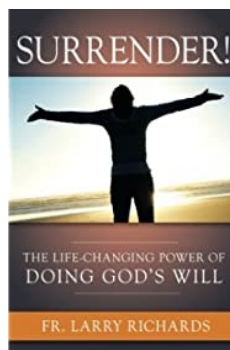

First, thank you for your ongoing financial support of our parish. We only have May and June prior to the end of the fiscal year.

- *Pentecost Envelope.* With the suspension of the public Masses, we ceased having income from the loose plate collection. Also, with regards to the EFT, some contributors are making their donations once a year from their retirement incomes. We have deficits too in our Christmas and Easter collections. To make up for these deficits, a Pentecost envelope will be sent to you. If you can, please help us reduce our deficit.
 - *2019-2020 Catholic Ministries Appeal (CMA).* As of May 11, 288 household have raised \$81,946 or 71.96% of our \$113,885 parish goal. If you can, please help us reduce our CMA deficit. Online donations can be made through the diocesan website - dor.org.
 - *2020 Building Projects.* This summer, we have three projects in place: the resealing of the new parking lot, the replacement of two HVAC rooftop units (two had already been replaced), and the replacement of the roof over the Parish Library. This past December, we found out that the church boiler is leaking. Please know that parishioners may donate the Building Fund at any time of the year. Donations made to the fund will only be used for our building projects - current and future projects.
 - *Expanding our live streaming capacities.* We are working on expanding our live-streaming capacities by installing additional camera in the Parish Center for Preschool, Christian Formation, and other parish events.
 - *Mass Intentions.* We have kept three of the four weekend Masses during the lockdown. Please continue to offer intentions at daily and weekend Masses for loved ones: for a special occasion, for the sick, the dead, etc. To offer an intention, please email Cathy through catherine.fafone@dor.org. Remember to specify date/s and Mass time/s that you are looking at.
 - *St. Patrick's Cemetery.* We are developing a plan to have a Columbarium section at the cemetery. The proposal is ready to submit to the bishop for approval.

Let there be light...

Form and Content

*Philip went down to the city of Samaria
and proclaimed the Christ to them.
With one accord, the crowds paid attention to
what was said by Philip
when they heard it and saw the signs he was doing.
For unclean spirits, crying out in a loud voice,
came out of many possessed people,
and many paralyzed or crippled people were cured.
There was great joy in that city.*

- Acts 8:5-8

In the First Reading today, we hear of the apostles ministry in Samaria and Jerusalem. Both places already had rich and strong religious traditions to the point that Samaritans and Jews were bitter rivals. Both places had been visited by Jesus, and locals would probably remember what he had said and done during his public ministry in their communities.

And now, it is the disciples' turn: they continue what Jesus had begun. The disciples proclaimed Jesus and performed signs. The good that the disciples had done brought joy to the people.

*Now when the apostles in Jerusalem
heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God,
they sent them Peter and John,
who went down and prayed for them,
that they might receive the Holy Spirit,
for it had not yet fallen upon any of them;
they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus.
Then they laid hands on them
and they received the Holy Spirit.*

- Acts 8:14-17

In Jerusalem, we hear of the people being baptized in the name of Jesus and eventually being laid hands on to receive the Holy Spirit. The practice resonates the celebration of the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. People are received into the fold through a process and this process involved a deepening of their identification and relationship with God, with Jesus and with the Holy Spirit.

*Always be ready to give an explanation
to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope,
but do it with gentleness and reverence,
keeping your conscience clear,
so that, when you are maligned,
those who defame your good conduct in Christ
may themselves be put to shame.
For it is better to suffer for doing good,
if that be the will of God, than for doing evil.*

- 1 Peter 3:15-17

What personal story of your about Christ have you shared with others? How was it received? Did its reception affect your attitude towards sharing your story?

A disciple must have both some objective and personal knowledge of Jesus. Objective because Jesus is real, and he taught impressively and performed mighty deeds. And personal because Jesus connected with individuals with acknowledgement of their uniqueness. Jesus can shape our decisions, and thus can leave a Christian imprint on our lives.

*Whoever has my commandments and observes them
is the one who loves me.*

*And whoever loves me will be loved by my Father,
and I will love him and reveal myself to him."*

- John 14:21

With this single verse, Jesus grounds our love for him on our observance of his commandments. Love and commandments need not be antithetical. Our observance of his commandments gives expression to our love for Jesus, and our love for Jesus is the reason for why we observe his commandments.

For us, present-day disciples, we have been left with what we need to live our lives as Christian disciples and to give witness to Jesus. Whatever we do, be it accepted by others or not, must be the fruit of our love for Jesus and his love for us. His teachings, his life, the Holy Spirit and his guidance, the development in his teachings by the apostles, and the witness of the apostles provide form and content for our discipleship.
