First Reading | Isaiah 63:16b-17, 19b; 64:2-7

You, LORD, are our father, our redeemer you are named forever. Why do you let us wander, O LORD, from your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear you not? Alma Redemptoris Mater is one of four great Marian hymns from the Divine Office or the Liturgy of the Hours. These hymns are sung to conclude the Compline or Night Prayer. The Alma Redemptoris Mater, credited to the monk Herman of Reichenau (1013–1054) is sung from the First Sunday of Advent, throughout the Christmas season, until the Baptism of the Lord. In the hymn's terse lines we find great theology, beautiful poetry, with a melody that approximates a lullaby.

Nurturing Mother of the Redeemer, who is passage to the heavens,
 gate of the souls of the departed, and star of the sea:
 help the falling people who seek to rise again.
 You who gave birth, nature marveling,
 to you holy Creator, Virgin before and even after,
 accepting that greeting from the mouth of Gabriel,
