

Sacrament of Baptism.

The sacrament through which God, in Jesus Christ, makes us His sons and daughters. To prepare for

reception, call Father Edison @ 924-7111.

Sacrament of the Eucharist. The sacrament through which God, like a responsible parent, feeds us, with food from heaven: His Word, and the Body and Blood of Jesus.

- **Weekday Masses:** Monday-Wednesday, Friday at 8:30 AM. Onsite and live on YouTube: Saint Patrick's Victor.
- For First Holy Communion, call Donna DeJoode at 924-2800 for more info.
- Family members may bring Holy Communion to other family members who are sick and homebound.

Sacrament of Confirmation. The sacrament through which God by the gift of the Holy Spirit strengthens us to give faithful witness to our Catholic Faith. To prepare for reception, call Elizabeth Johnston @ 924-2800.

- Children, older than 7 y/o, and adults who needs to be baptized, receive Communion and/or be Confirmed, call Deacon John @ 924-7111.

Sacrament of Reconciliation. The sacrament through which God's mercy and love, justice and truth heals the wound of human sin. *Generally offered an hour before each Mass.* Please give the priest fifteen minutes before Mass to prepare for Mass.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The sacrament through which Jesus continues to heal the sick among us. Anointing is offered at each Mass on the first weekend of the month. Or call Fr. Edison @ 924-7111 to schedule an anointing.

Sacrament of Marriage. The sacrament through which God calls a man and woman to become visible signs of His Love. Call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111 for more info.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. The sacrament through which the mission Jesus entrusted to the apostles is continued in the Church. To learn more about vocations to the ordained ministry, please call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111.

Year of the Sacraments Christ, Catechesis, Celebration

XVIII. We Become Whom We Receive.

At the very heart of every celebration of the sacraments is the encounter between God and the faithful, and the Eucharist through its parts spells out for us this encounter between Jesus Christ and his disciples.

I. Introductory Rites. It begins with Jesus' intent to gather His disciples that we may encounter Him. Within the first part is the Penitential Act through which we recognize our offenses to God and neighbor. In seeking and receiving forgiveness, our relationship with God and one another is restored, enabling us to worthily celebrate the sacred mysteries. Before the Collect or Opening Prayer, during the brief pause, remember to offer to God your prayer intentions. The first part identifies us as *the people gathered and restored by God.*

II. Liturgy of the Word. Jesus has made known to us the alimentary nature of the Word of God: "*Man does not live by bread alone but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.*" Through the Old Testament, we hear God's promises, and in the New Testament, we find their fulfillment in Jesus Christ. The Homily is intended to expound on the readings or themes of faith. Our response to the Word of God is our Profession of Faith in God, through the Creed. After we listen to God, we make known to Him our prayers through the Prayer of the Faithful. The second part identifies us as *the people nourished and shaped by the Word of God.*

III. Liturgy of the Eucharist. Jesus is the Word made flesh, the Lamb of God. In Jesus, we learn that to fulfill the Word of God is to give ourselves completely to God. None among the children of Adam had done and can do this successfully, and so Jesus freely chose to do it for us, sacrificing himself to the Father. At Offertory, we offer to God the work of our hands so that at Consecration, what we offered is perfected in the sacrifice of Jesus, whose Body and Blood gives us divine life. The third part identifies us as *the people nourished and shaped by the Son of God.*

IV. Concluding Rites. Having gathered by God, informed by His Word, and transformed by His Son, God sends us forth to continue the mission He gave us through His Son, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. God has done something beautiful for us. It is must not be kept to ourselves but must be shared with others. The fourth part identifies us as *the people sent on a mission by God.*

Catechism 101



- **Why is the Eucharist called Holy Communion?** (CCC 1331) The Eucharist is called Holy Communion, because by it we unite ourselves with Christ.
- **Why is the Eucharist called Holy Mass?** (CCC 1332) The Eucharist is called Holy Mass (Latin: Missa), because it concludes with the sending forth (Latin: missio) of the faithful.
- **What significance do bread and wine receive in the Exodus?** (CCC 1334) In the Exodus bread and wine receive the following significance: (1) the bread remembers the hasty liberation of Israel from Egypt and the manna in the desert, and (2) the wine adds joy and an eschatological dimension.
- **Which miracles of Christ prefigure the superabundance of the Eucharist?** (CCC 1335) Christ's miracles of the multiplication of the loaves prefigure the superabundance of the Eucharist.
- **Why did Christ institute the Eucharist?** (CCC 1337) Christ instituted the Eucharist in order: (1) to leave to the Church a pledge of His love, (2) never to depart from His own, and (3) to make the Church share in His Passover.

Instructions for the Weekend Masses

- **Sign Up!** Signing-up ensures accommodation as well as serves as help as a tracking system. Links are found on the parish website, and on the parish app. No internet or smart phone? Please call the Parish Office at 924-7111 to sign-up. *If you fail to sign-up and we are expecting a full-house, you may be asked to wait until signees are seated, and will be admitted only if there is an available seat.*
- **Be Safe!** At all times, please observe: (i) proper wearing of face mask by covering both nose and mouth, (ii) hand sanitizing before entering the premises, and (iii) observing the 6ft social distancing with people not of your household, especially during Holy Communion and Dismissal.
- **Watch the Numbers!**
 - * If signees are mostly in small groups of 1 or 2, we can accommodate ~100 per Mass. If coming as a small group, please occupy the outside section of the pew.
 - * If a good number of signees are in groups of 3 or 4, we can accommodate ~140 per Mass. If coming as a bigger group of three or more, please use the inside section of the pew.
- **Be Charitable!** Consider it an act of charity to occupy the front pews first. You will make it easier for the ushers to locate pews for those who arrive after you.
- **Better Stay at Home.** If you require for yourself more than 6 feet of social distancing from others, for health reasons, it is better that you stay at home during this time. If you participate in the celebration of Holy Mass via live stream and wish to receive Holy Communion, email Father Edison (fr.edison.tayag@dor.org), to set-up a time when you can come over during the weekday.
- **Ushers, Help!** With the safety protocols currently in place, it is clear that ushers do play a crucial role at every weekend Mass. We need additional help. If you can assist, please email Father Edison and let him know at which Mass you can help and how often. We are truly grateful to ushers who serve during this time. Also much appreciated are volunteers who help with the camera for live streaming. Thank you for your help!






Confirmation Candidates

Let there be light...

Called to Remain with God

The LORD called Samuel again, for the third time. Getting up and going to Eli, he said, "Here I am. You called me." Then Eli understood that the LORD was calling the youth. So he said to Samuel, "Go to sleep, and if you are called, reply, Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." When Samuel went to sleep in his place, the LORD came and revealed his presence, calling out as before, "Samuel, Samuel!" Samuel answered, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

- Isaiah 55:10-11

At the very heart of the spiritual life is the relationship between the God who speaks and the man who hears, the God who calls and the man who listens.

The Book of Genesis opens with God saying, "Let there be..." God reveals Himself as the Creator. And the Book of Revelation ends with Jesus saying, "Yes, I am coming soon." Jesus speaks of his second coming when he will redeem and restore all creation in himself. One can say that through the Bible, God makes known to us that He created us and that we belong to Him. The vocation of those who hear and listen to God is to make known the will of God and to bring it fulfillment themselves.

It is not easy to hear, particularly when there is too much noise inside and outside us. The faithful must learn to seek silence and to quiet oneself in order to hear God in the ways that chooses to speak. In Samuel, we find one who placed himself in the presence of God, and he heard when the divine voice called him.

It is not easy to listen, particularly when we allow ourselves to be distracted and when we have preconceived notions about those who speak and call us. The faithful must learn to calm down competing voices and properly discern the voice of God. In Samuel, he was gifted with Eli who helped him correct his preconceived notion and discern and respond to the call of God.

Enter Jesus.

John was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, "Behold, the Lamb of God."

The two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus. Jesus turned and saw them following him and said to them, "What are you looking for?"

They said to him, "Rabbi" - which translated means Teacher -, "where are you staying?"

He said to them, "Come, and you will see."

- John 1:35

Already, at the initial instance that John points his disciples to Jesus, he referred to him as the *Lamb of God* - selected, called, and sent by God, and Jesus himself willing to be offered for sacrifice.

John wants his disciples, any disciple to behold Jesus. To behold is to see with intent and focus, not allowing noise and distractions to interfere. For only then can disciples begin to take the first steps to follow Jesus, with intent and focus. In the way that John spoke, he enabled his disciples to hear and listen to Jesus.

Keep your parish staff in your daily prayers.

"What are you looking for?" Jesus goes at the heart of the matter - what does one consider to give meaning to his/her existence? [Read through John, and find out how this question radically changes when asked by Jesus after his resurrection.]

"Rabbi, where are you staying?" They called Jesus rabbi - the great one in relation to learners, therefore, the teacher. The disciples understood that they could learn from Jesus. Their question sought to know more about Jesus.

To stay, to remain is a verb, that is a powerful theme in the fourth gospel. As the disciples would eventually learn, Jesus would be on the move, traveling from Galilee to Jerusalem, passing through towns and villages. Jesus would not stay or remain in one town or village, and so do the disciples. Jesus would teach his disciples that it is with him that disciples truly stay or remain.

During the Ordinary Time, we are invited to follow Jesus, to stay, to remain with him. As we stay and remain with Jesus, may we clearly hear his voice, and listen to his call. And as he shows us how to respond to the Father, may we do also as Jesus himself did.
