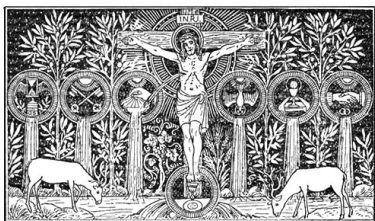

Sacrament of Baptism.

The sacrament through which God, in Jesus Christ, makes us His sons and daughters. To prepare for

reception, call Father Edison @ 924-7111.

Sacrament of the Eucharist. The sacrament through which God, like a responsible parent, feeds us, with food from heaven: His Word, and the Body and Blood of Jesus.

Sacrament of Confirmation. The sacrament through which God by the gift of the Holy Spirit strengthens us to give faithful witness to our Catholic Faith. To prepare for reception, call Elizabeth Johnston @ 924-2800.

- Children, older than 7 y/o, and adults who needs to be baptized, receive Communion and/or be Confirmed, call Deacon John @ 924-7111.

Sacrament of Reconciliation. The sacrament through which God's mercy and love, justice and truth heals the wound of human sin. *Generally offered an hour before each Mass.* Please give the priest fifteen minutes before Mass to prepare for Mass.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The sacrament through which Jesus continues to heal the sick among us. Anointing is offered at each Mass on the first weekend of the month. Or call Fr. Edison @ 924-7111 to schedule an anointing.

Sacrament of Marriage. The sacrament through which God calls a man and woman to become visible signs of His Love. Call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111 for more info.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. The sacrament through which the mission Jesus entrusted to the apostles is continued in the Church. To learn more about vocations to the ordained ministry, please call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111.

Year of the Life in Christ

On Sin

What is sin and its effects? *Sin is an offense against reason, truth, and right conscience; it is failure in genuine love for God and neighbor caused by a perverse attachment to certain goods. It wounds the nature of man and injures human solidarity. It has been defined as "an utterance, a deed, or a desire contrary to the eternal law."*

Sin is an offense against God: "Against you, you alone, have I sinned, and done that which is evil in your sight." Sin sets itself against God's love for us and turns our hearts away from it. Like the first sin, it is disobedience, a revolt against God through the will to become "like gods," knowing and determining good and evil. Sin is thus "love of oneself even to contempt of God." In this proud self-exaltation, sin is diametrically opposed to the obedience of Jesus, which achieves our salvation.

It is precisely in the Passion, when the mercy of Christ is about to vanquish it, that sin most clearly manifests its violence and its many forms: unbelief, murderous hatred, shunning and mockery by the leaders and the people, Pilate's cowardice and the cruelty of the soldiers, Judas' betrayal - so bitter to Jesus, Peter's denial and the disciples' flight. However, at the very hour of darkness, the hour of the prince of this world, The sacrifice of Christ secretly becomes the source from which the forgiveness of our sins will pour forth inexhaustibly. Catechism 1849-51

What are the kinds of sin? *There are a great many kinds of sins. Scripture provides several lists of them. the Letter to the Galatians contrasts the works of the flesh with the fruit of the Spirit: "Now the works of the flesh are plain: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, anger, selfishness, dissension, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and the like. I warn you, as I warned you before, that those who do such things shall not inherit the Kingdom of God."*

Sins can be distinguished according to their objects, as can every human act; or according to the virtues they oppose, by excess or defect; or according to the commandments they violate. They can also be classed according to whether they concern God, neighbor, or oneself; they can be divided into spiritual and carnal sins, or again as sins in thought, word, deed, or omission. the root of sin is in the heart of man, in his free will, according to the teaching of the Lord: "For out of the heart come evil thoughts, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. These are what defile a man." But in the heart also resides charity, the source of the good and pure works, which sin wounds. Catechism, 1852-53

A synodal Church walks forward in communion to pursue a common mission through the participation of each and every one of her members. The objective of this Synodal process is not to provide a temporary or one-time experience of synodality, but rather to **provide an opportunity for the entire People of God to discern together how to move forward on the path towards being a more synodal Church in the long-term.**

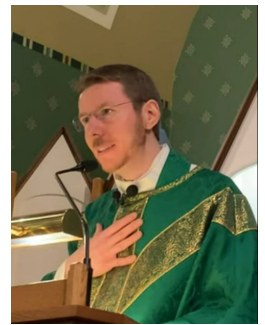

Joseph of Nazareth. The first feature film ever on the story of St. Joseph, who was a carpenter, the husband of Mary, and the foster father of Jesus Christ. Did You Know?

In order for our choices between good and evil to mean something—for them to be moral choices—we must be free in our choice. Similarly, our love for God would not truly be love if it were forced. Love cannot be forced. Free will is a gift from God Himself and is a faculty or ability of the soul. It is one of the ways in which we are made in the image and likeness of God. The Catechism, of the Catholic Church defines freedom as "the power, rooted in reason and will, to act or not to act, to do this or that, and so to perform deliberate actions on one's own responsibility" (CCC 1731). God respects our dignity by allowing us to be in control of our actions and responsible for our choices.

Let there be light...

Bound to Truth. Bound for Heaven.

*Pilate said to Jesus,
"Are you the King of the Jews?"*

- John 18:33b

Pontius Pilate was the governor of Judea, a Roman province between 26-37 AD. As such, Pilate presided over the trial of Jesus and consented to His crucifixion. As a political figure, Pilate had to ascertain who Jesus was. Pilate represented the emperor, the king of the Roman Empire. Any one who claimed himself as king other than the emperor might have to be eliminated according to the threat he brought to the political order.

*Jesus answered, "Do you say this on your own
or have others told you about me?"*

Pilate answered, "I am not a Jew, am I?"

*Your own nation and the chief priests handed you over to me.
What have you done?"*

- John 18:34-35

Probably both. On his own, because Pilate was the local ruler. It fell within his jurisdiction to maintain peace and order. Others too, for political and religious reasons, had told him, because Pilate had the power to decide on the case brought against Jesus.

Jesus answered, "My kingdom does not belong to this world.

If my kingdom did belong to this world,

my attendants would be fighting

to keep me from being handed over to the Jews.

But as it is, my kingdom is not here."

- John 18:36

Although Jesus did not explicitly reply that He is king, He did implicitly by making reference His kingdom, which is not of this world.

For Pilate and also for us, present-day Christian disciples, we must carefully reflect on this information that we may properly understand and appreciate the Jesus as King, whose kingdom is not of this world. Learning from Pilate, based on his decision to condemn Jesus to a death by crucifixion, the pronouncement of Jesus may be wrongly understood only from a political perspective - Jesus must be eliminated to maintain worldly order. This is an incomplete understanding of who Jesus truly is!

For any Christian disciple, the pronouncement of Jesus must be understood according to Jesus' understanding of Himself.

Jesus is the Son of God, through whom and in whom, the kingship of creation has been entrusted. While all earthly rulers are mere mortals, Jesus the Son of God is both God and man.

Jesus' kingdom is not of the earth but of heaven. While Jesus does not pose direct threat to any earthly ruler or kingdom, He definitely challenges and expands one's understanding of here and now. With Jesus, it is not enough to be merely earthly or coincidental. It is more real to be God-related and therefore, intentional and heaven-bound. And not that the heavenly has nothing to do with earthly, but exactly the opposite: the heavenly seeks to transform the earthly.

So Pilate said to him, "Then you are a king?"

Jesus answered, "You say I am a king.

*For this I was born and for this I came into the world,
to testify to the truth.*

Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

- John 18:37

Again, from Pilate, we learn that it is one thing to say that Jesus is king, it is different to acknowledge His kingdom, and properly acknowledge at that. Pilate was skeptic. Did he ask Jesus, "What is truth?" He and Jesus could be more different in their attitude towards truth. Jesus claims that He is truth, He came to give witness to the truth, and those who listen to Him belong to the truth.

In the secular age of post-truth, Jesus and Christianity could be more relevant. Where there is no truth, there is mere opinion and confusion. Where there is truth, there is God. Where there is God, there is where man must be and become.

Instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI, the Solemnity of Christ the King as a response to growing secularism and nationalism. May Christ the King help us understand the earthly in light of the heavenly, that men and women have a higher calling, not limited to earth, but bound for God in heaven.
