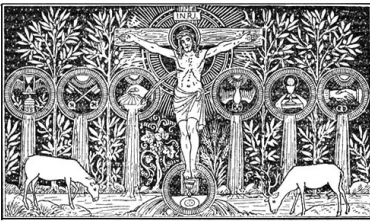

## **Sacrament of Baptism.**

The sacrament through which God, in Jesus Christ, makes us His sons and daughters. To prepare for

reception, call Father Edison @ 924-7111.

**Sacrament of the Eucharist.** The sacrament through which God, like a responsible parent, feeds us, with food from heaven: His Word, and the Body and Blood of Jesus.

- **Weekend Masses:** Saturday at 4:30 PM, Sunday at 8:30, 10:30 AM and 5 PM. Onsite and livestreaming on YouTube: Saint Patrick's Victor.
- **Weekday Masses:** Monday-Wednesday, Friday at 8:30 AM. Onsite and live on YouTube: Saint Patrick's Victor.
- For First Holy Communion, call Donna DeJoodé at 924-2800 for more info.
- Family members may bring Holy Communion to other family members who are sick and homebound.

**Sacrament of Confirmation.** The sacrament through which God by the gift of the Holy Spirit strengthens us to give faithful witness to our Catholic Faith. To prepare for reception, call Elizabeth Johnston @ 924-2800.

- Children, older than 7 y/o, and adults who needs to be baptized, receive Communion and/or be Confirmed, call Deacon John @ 924-7111.

**Sacrament of Reconciliation.** The sacrament through which God's mercy and love, justice and truth heals the wound of human sin. *Generally offered an hour before each Mass.* Please give the priest fifteen minutes before Mass to prepare for Mass.

**Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.** The sacrament through which Jesus continues to heal the sick among us. Anointing is offered at each Mass on the first weekend of the month. Or call Fr. Edison @ 924-7111 to schedule an anointing.

**Sacrament of Marriage.** The sacrament through which God calls a man and woman to become visible signs of His Love. Call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111 for more info.

**Sacrament of Holy Orders.** The sacrament through which the mission Jesus entrusted to the apostles is continued in the Church. To learn more about vocations to the ordained ministry, please call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111.

## **Year of the Sacraments Christ, Catechesis, Celebration**

### III. The Domestic Church

(Please refer to the Catechism, §1655-1658)

*Christ chose to be born and grow up in the bosom of the holy family of Joseph and Mary. The Church is nothing other than "the family of God." From the beginning, the core of the Church was often constituted by those who had become believers "together with all [their] household." When they were converted, they desired that "their whole household" should also be saved. These families who became believers were islands of Christian life in an unbelieving world.* - Catechism, §1655

Jesus was born in the heart of the family. In so doing, he gave his Church both familial face and familial intimacy. God is the common Father of all believers. Mary is the Blessed Mother of the faithful. Joseph is the protector of the Church. And Jesus is our brother.

In his public ministry, when Jesus began calling his disciples and encountering peoples, he began touching their families as well - remember Jesus healing Peter's mother-in-law, the Canaanite and her daughter, and even the centurion and his household servant. Indeed, when one encounters Jesus, that person desires that the rest of his/her household would also encounter and come to know Jesus.

*It is here that the father of the family, the mother, children, and all members of the family exercise the priesthood of the baptized in a privileged way "by the reception of the sacraments, prayer and thanksgiving, the witness of a holy life, and self-denial and active charity." Thus the home is the first school of Christian life and "a school for human enrichment."* - Catechism, §1657

What makes the family Christian? Within the Christian family, Christian disciples intentionally form other Christian disciples. By marriage, parents exercise their priesthood over their household. By Baptism, every member exercises his/her priesthood for fellow family members.

How should family members exercise their priesthood? According to what Jesus did for his disciples. By allowing us to enter more deeply into his Paschal Mystery, and for us, present-day disciples, through the sacraments. By teaching us how to encounter God in prayer and thanksgiving. By living the life according to the Kingdom of God, in community as Church. By living a life that is intentional about knowing oneself and stepping out of oneself, through good stewardship and generous service for others. For these, the family home is rightly called "the domestic church."

### Catechism 101

- **Why is the Liturgy not merely the remembrance of the Paschal Mysteries? (CCC 1104)** The Liturgy is not merely the remembrance of the Paschal mysteries, because it does not only remember them but also makes them present. The Paschal Mysteries are the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.
- **Where is the place of the anamnesis and epiclesis in the sacramental celebration? (CCC 1106)** The place of the anamnesis and epiclesis is at the heart of each sacramental celebration. Anamnesis is the liturgical remembrance of the salvific works of God. Epiclesis is the invocation or calling of the Holy Spirit.
- **Why is the Church the great 'sacrament' of divine communion? (CCC 1108)** The Church is the great 'sacrament' of divine communion, because: (1) the Holy Spirit, who is the Spirit of communion, abides indefectibly in the Church, and (2) the Church gathers God's scattered children together. The Church is called a 'sacrament' in an analogical sense.

### Weekend Masses in the Parish



- **Use Sign Up Genius.** As more parishioners attend weekend Masses in person, signing up will ensure your spot. Links are found on the parish website, on the parish app, and updates are regularly posted on our parish Facebook page. If not done yet, please download the parish app to make signing up for Mass easier. For those who have no internet or smart phone, please call the Parish Office at 924-7111 to sign-up for weekend Mass.
- **Basics.** At all times, please observe: (i) proper wearing of face mask by covering both nose and mouth, (ii) hand sanitizing before entering the premises, and (iii) observing the 6ft social distancing with people not of your household, especially during Holy Communion and Dismissal.
- **Maximizing safe accommodation.** How much can actually be accommodated depends on the group size. When sign-ups consist of groups of 1 or 2 person, the church space can hold about 100. When sign-ups consist of larger groups, the church space can hold more persons. Notice the pews, each is divided into a narrower outside

section (next to the side aisle) and a wider inside section (next to the main aisle). In order to safely and comfortably accommodate 143 persons in church (33% capacity), if you come by yourself or with another person, please occupy the narrower outside section of the pew. And if you come with at least two other persons, occupy the wider inside section of the pew.

- **Occupy the front pews first.** Consider it an act of charity to occupy the front pews first. You will make it easier for the ushers to locate pews for those who arrive after you. You also will make the process of disinfection less time consuming, particularly at the daily Masses. Before leaving, put down the kneeler to the floor for disinfection.
- **Your safety.** If you require for yourself more than 6 feet of social distancing from others, for health reasons, it is better that you stay at home during this time. If you participate in the celebration of Holy Mass via live stream and wish to receive Holy Communion, email Father Edison (fr.edison.tayag@dor.org), to set-up a time when you can come over during the weekday.
- **Additional Ushers.** With the safety protocols currently in place, it is clear that ushers do play a crucial role at every weekend Mass. We need additional help. If you can assist, please email Father Edison and let him know at which Mass you can help and how often. We are truly grateful to ushers who serve during this time. Also much appreciated are volunteers who help with the camera for live streaming. Thank you for your help!

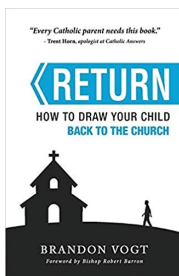

### The Gift of Time and the Sacraments

*How much of your time do you devote  
for the celebration of the sacraments?*

- **Baptism and Confirmation.** Irrepeatable, but ongoing witness of one's life in Christ in your role as a parent or godparents/sponsor. Do connect with your godchild regularly.
- **Eucharist.** Every Sunday. Although the Sunday obligation is temporarily suspended because of the coronavirus, do find ways to prayerfully read the Scripture readings, and to still participate in the public celebration of the Mass in person or in public.
- **Penance and Reconciliation.** At least once a year. It is a good practice to receive the sacrament once a month. Do confess mortal sins as soon as possible.
- **Anointing of the Sick.** Repeatable, whenever threatened by serious illness or when preparing to undergo surgery. Anointing needs to be differentiated from the Last Rites, which is the celebration of Penance and Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick and reception of Holy Communion together, by the dying.
- **Matrimony.** Repeatable, in event of death of spouse or annulment. Give ongoing witness as husband and wife, as signs of the love between Christ and His Church.

Let there be light...

### On the Dignity of the Human Worker

*Seek the LORD while he may be found,  
call him while he is near.  
Let the scoundrel forsake his way,  
and the wicked his thoughts;  
let him turn to the LORD for mercy;  
to our God, who is generous in forgiving.  
For my thoughts are not your thoughts,  
nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD.  
As high as the heavens are above the earth,  
so high are my ways above your ways  
and my thoughts above your thoughts.*

- Isaiah 55:6-9

Why does God desire that sinners become saints? Why does God want us, sinners, to turn to Him for mercy? Why is God generous and forgiving to our offenses against Him and one another?

Simple, because God is God! And God wants us to be like Him, not in a superficial way, but in a profound way. Remember: God created us in His image and likeness. Truly, our desire to become like God has come from God Himself.

Too bad, we forget this wonderful reality. In forgetting, we may misunderstand God as our enemy. In forgetting, we fail to turn to God and avail ourselves of the help that only comes from God, the only help that can really make a difference in our desire to be become like God.

It is helpful to know that the ways of God are high above our ways. Now we know, and we can properly orient ourselves in relation to God. Now we know, and we can start or continue in approaching the heights of God's ways.

In the Gospel, Jesus demonstrates for us the way of God through the parable of the generous landowner -

*The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner  
who went out at dawn to hire laborers for his vineyard.  
After agreeing with them for the usual daily wage,  
he sent them into his vineyard.*

- Matthew 20:1-2

In this parable, we encounter a landowner who appears both attentive to maximizing the work day as he went out precisely at dawn to hire laborers, and fair as he settled with the laborers the usual daily wage.

*Going out about nine o'clock...  
he went out again around noon, and around three o'clock...  
Going out about five o'clock...*

- Matthew 20:3, 5, 6

Yet we learn that the landowner kept going to the marketplace - visiting it four more times after dawn. And he kept settling with the laborers for the usual daily wage. He kept hiring laborers and settling for the daily wage in a way that places himself at a 'disadvantage' - he was to dish out equal pay to all the hired laborers, aware of diminishing returns. Simply, he was hiring to benefit the laborers.

*When those who had started about five o'clock came, each received the usual daily wage. So when the first came, they thought that they would receive more, but each of them also got the usual wage. And on receiving it they grumbled against the landowner...*

- Matthew 20:9-11
